AGAPE now oversees the Columbia County food bank

"Fill the men's sacks with food."

GAPE recently began partnering with the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank to administer the monthly Columbia County Food Bank which serves approximately 700 families per month.

Since July 1, 2015, AGAPE has overseen the operations of the Columbia County Food Bank in the following locations:

Berwick at the Salvation Army on the 4th Wednesday of each month, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Bloomsburg, Catawissa and Lightstreet at the AGAPE Center on the 3rd Friday of each month, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Greenwood and Madison Townships and Millville at the Greenwood Township Municipal Building on the 3rd Friday of each month, 12 p.m. to 3 p.m.

Orangeville and Orange Township at the Orange Township Municipal Building on the 3rd Saturday of each month, 9-10 a.m.

Benton at the Northern Columbia County Cultural Center on the 3rd Tuesday of each month, 9-11 a.m. **Wilberton I and II** at the Wilberton Senior Center on the 2nd Thursday of each month, 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

AGAPE uses volunteers to help in packing, receiving, and distribution at the AGAPE Center. Volunteers are needed from time to time at the other distributions centers as well. To volunteer, call the AGAPE Center at 570-317-2210.

Each month, AGAPE staff orders food from the Central PA Food Bank. Eighty-two percent of the food supplied comes from corporate donations. Eighteen percent is government supplied.

Residents may register for only one of the county food banks and must provide I.D. and proof of residency. The AGAPE Center continues to supplement this program with the on-going food distributions and meals as in the past.

Listening to themselves

This particular Monday night starts with 12 children ages 4 through 11 transforming a conference table into an extended family dinner area. Plates, napkins, and eating utensils are carefully placed. Water glasses are filled. Scented candles are lit, fresh flowers are arranged, and soft music wafts through the room. After a short explanation, chef Tom Peterman and his staff begin preparing the stir-fry entrée of oven-baked rice crowned with chicken and steamed vegetables.

And almost effortlessly, program supervisor Julie Matylewicz glides from one child to another, reminding them of the social details of courtesy, the grace of waiting for everyone to have a plate before starting their meals, and the benefits of healthy eating.

To the children of parents involved in the AGAPE Getting Ahead in a Gettin' By World this is just one of many well-planned and exceptionally organized programs taking place while the adults work through their own sessions. Julie has set up evenings that include time at the YMCA, storytelling with librarian Hal Pratt, canine education with certified dog trainer Eileen Drummond, the Pillow Case Project, Bell Choir, an American Flag ceremony with the Boy Scouts, and many more.

"I have had the best of times coming here," said one young participant between mouthfuls of his meal. "We have all learned so much, and Julie allows us to do everything ourselves. It's just great."

In addition to the many presenters from

community programs, Julie is assisted by Judy Ryan and two young ladies who help with the children. One is Kiley, a Girl Scout working on her Silver Star. "I help where I am needed," she said, "and this is helping me finish my Journey Book of Activities." Kiley is joined by rising eighth grader Teja, who already volunteers with several AGAPE programs. Both help these children with games, supervision, and activities.

As Julie picks up a tray loaded with bowls of fresh fruit, she explains that a prior week's lesson on Emily Post etiquette prepared her children for tonight's dinner experience. And as if on cue, several "thank you's" from the well-behaved children fill the air as dessert is served.

After the table was cleared, the children lined up with their partners and crossed the street to the Children's Museum where they were greeted by museum director Shawna Meiser and Tooth Fairy Sasha who ended the meal program by explaining the benefits of daily tooth care. Then the children were invited to explore and participate in the museum's various exhibits before ending the night with each receiving their own packet of toothbrushes and toothpaste.

Julie explained that every activity is designed so that the children "listen to themselves, become aware of their feelings, and keep in touch with their own emotions." But one young man said it best when he exclaimed, "We have a lot of fun here, but I am also learning how to work with others and respect myself."

Lots of good news this month!

Berwick Health and Wellness Fund approved a \$20,000.00 grant to AGAPE for Berwick area residents in need. Berwick represents about 32% of our clients. This is the fourth year BHWH has given AGAPE a grant. Each year they have been increasingly generous.

"Getting Ahead in a Just Gettin' By World" has started its second class. A Berwick class will start the end of August at New Covenant Christian Church thanks to a generous financial grant from the Berwick Area United Way.

Good Samaritan in Danville is partnering with AGAPE to start a class in August at Mahoning Presbyterian Church. Their funding is at the halfway point thanks to generous individual donors. Judy Ryan, (Bloomsburg), Lisa Jarrett (Berwick) and Joan Miller and Betsy Hack (both of Danville and with Good Samaritan) are now certified facilitators for "Getting Ahead in a Just Gettin' By World" and preparing for our next classes.

Eight people are in the current class. Jake Woodward, AHA Process coordinator, reports they are doing well and are excited about what they are learning. Julie Matylewicz, our volunteer children's supervisor, has done a marvelous job developing a program for the children of our "Getting Ahead" participants. They are learning table etiquette; were taught what to take with them in a home emergency by the American Red Cross; heard moral principles through Bloomsburg Public librarian Hal Pratt's storytelling; experienced dog therapy and learned safety from Eileen Drummond; and practiced bell ringing under the direction of Mary Osborne, Angie Rock and Mani Siegfried of Good Shepherd United Methodist Church, Bloomsburg, with more to come. Both adults and children enjoy food prepared by ladies of the First English Baptist Church and the Church of Latter Day Saints.

AGAPE has a new, enthusiastic grant writer whose focus is applying for operational grants so more money contributed by our

faithful financial donors can go directly to clients. Please pray for success.

Elsie Angus is our new Volunteer Coordinator with Jacqui Willis assisting, updating our volunteer application and handbook and developing a training session.

Our volunteers are the firm foundation that makes AGAPE work. I heard a saying about volunteers that is so true for AGAPE: "Volunteers are not paid, not because they are worthless, but because they are priceless." Thank you volunteers.
