Because of your great mercy

"O my God, incline your ear and hear. Open your eyes and see our desolations, and the city that is called by your name. For we do not present our pleas before you because of our righteousness, but because of your great mercy." Daniel 9:18

AGAPE's staff and counselors are always ready to help with our clients' physical needs. But as men, women, and families arrive, one of the twelve current Daniel Prayer Group members is likely to walk over and ask if they also need help "filling a spiritual need." Each offer to talk includes the reassurance that AGAPE cares about their spiritual lives as much as food, clothing, and shelter.

Daniel volunteer Ginger Hock says that this offer usually begins with reading scripture so clients can make peace with God. "God is the power; he gives us the power," she said. And many clients accept the offer.

Each volunteer has a life-changing story from a Daniel experience. Hock remembers a mother with young children who just needed some hope. "We never pressure anyone to pray with us. We always ask if we can pray with them, and most times they say yes."

Hock was able to work with a caseworker who provided food, paper supplies, and

a lead on an apartment, but what she remembers most is what happened as the family was leaving. "She stopped and gave me a hug," said Hock, a testament to God's saving grace and mercy.

Shirley Moskovich is another Daniel volunteer who has witnessed the power of this ministry. "Most always, clients just want someone to hear what they have to say. They need people to listen, a chance to share their story. When we talk to them, they learn things about themselves. Our clients have to deal with significant issues that include jobs, money, family, and we strive to give them hope, the faith that life will improve," she said.

"Personally, I work with them to start thinking about what the Lord wants me to do with the rest of my life," she added.

Hock encourages clients to think of their own choices and "where they want to be." I remind myself that we have all made mistakes," she said.

Moskovich agrees that clients have to start somewhere, and the Daniel volunteers never judge their pasts. "I always remember my parents telling me to 'put yourself in their shoes," she said. She often suggests to clients that belonging to a church family is a good start for personal stability.

A struggling economy and spiraling unemployment have left over 8,000 people without access to nutritionally adequate foods. Recently, AGAPE had its largest meal to date with over 130 individuals in attendance.

Reflecting on our blessings

Letter from the Executive Director

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

Unbelievably, we are in our last quarter of 2013. Young or old, we find the passing of time is fast. We have come to the jolting awareness that a "bitter" winter may be upon us, and we at AGAPE are concerned about the winter. Generally summers at

AGAPE are slower than the rest of the year because our clients' bills are more manageable, giving them less financial stress. We use that slow time to save money for the winter months.

This summer has been very different, and we were not able to save as much. Comparing our third quarter status of 2012 with 2013's third quarter, we found a wonderful 256% increase of in-kind donations; however, financial donations

have decreased 11.55%. We are concerned, particularly for our ability to help with heating bills.

Because of amazing 2011 donations, last year AGAPE was able to set aside \$20,000 for heating assistance. Between November 2012 and March 2013 we helped 73 clients, expending \$18,860.86 for heating assistance. Depending on individual circumstances, each client approved last winter received \$100-\$500 with the average being \$250. That assistance did not cover minimum delivery. LIHEAP assisted with some funding, but that will be lower this year.

When LIHEAP was combined with what little the client had and what AGAPE provided, the cost of minimum delivery was generally met. Although the cost of heating oil this year is lower than last, our experience suggests a significant need will still exist. Our estimate for a minimum delivery of 125 gallons of heating oil is \$448. That doesn't provide a month of heat at 58 degrees F. You now understand why we at AGAPE are concerned.

We have designated recent fundraisers for heating assistance and currently have \$3,000 in such funds. We have received annual grants from The Berwick Health and Wellness Foundation, the Bloomsburg Area Community Fund, Central Susquehanna Community Foundation, The Community of Christ and The Susquehanna Conference of the United Methodist Church. All have been generous financial supporters,

even advising us about additional grant opportunities. We compile, track and report the statistics for all the programs administered by AGAPE needed to secure grants, and now have an efficient database, and a newly formed, talented and active grant team is diligently searching for those grant opportunities.

We continue to pray that God will help us bring our community together to support our neighbors. We appreciate so much all of your support, prayers, service, and contributions.
